Like, it it quotes a long tirade in which you decry, you know, essentially Andrew Tate style fake hyper masculinity and and call for a more well-rounded and positive vision for young men. and it quotes that like you're a Nazi. So >> yeah, >> it's really funny actually if you if you actually have it up there. I don't know if you have like notes or

if you actually have the website up. If you have the website up, you should look at the top and see how they categorized me, you know, cuz they have categories of what type of bad person you are.

>> Yeah, I see. And so there's the hyperlink to anti-LGBTQ >> and then conspiracy propagandists are the two related. Maybe there's some maybe there's some additional >> Well, there's a category I mean I don't have it in front of me. There's a categorization at the top. I'll just tell you what I'm thinking of. Um, one of the categories is that they called me they put me under anti-government general, which you know, so I'm generally I guess anti-government now.

Um, so I took that as a title and I was like, so I'm the anti-government general. Cool. And then they also categorized me under General Hate, which I also took as a title and I did a podcast thanking them for calling me General Hate and made a bunch of graphics. I think I sell t-shirts about me being General Hate where I photoshop my face onto an old, you know, Revolutionary War painting or something. And um yeah, so they're they're crazy. I mean, if you actually look through it, you'll find that there's this opening section. what they accuse me of there is like four things I think and three of them are kind of true in the twisted left-wing way and then I don't actually promote the white genocide theory like that's literally made up off of one interpretation of one tweet that I made that was taken out of context years ago and so they made try to make as much hay out of like nothing as they possibly could but then if you scroll down just a little bit the first thing they talk about in any substantial way about me is that I made a series of tweets mocking George Floyd on January 6th. Here's two. I was just in New Zealand, right? And I was invited there to speak by the deputy prime minister which seems like kind of a cool thing. Same as, you know, you'll get certain articles written about you if you've upset the apple cart enough and say Vox or Salon or Slate or one of these kind of hit piece rags will write a thing about you and then that will be the become the citation written into your Wikipedia and I have some fairly solid back channel information that that is actually partially not entirely Wikipedia editors are not all you know some nefarious cult but that there are

embedded you know deliberate actors who are putting that stuff into your Wikipedia profile such that you know somebody comes across my work, they're like, "Who's this James Lindsay guy?" They go look at my Wikipedia and it says all this crazy stuff about me.

And unless you kind of have the magic decoder goggles of the censorship industrial complex mentality, then you read it, you're just like, "Oh, he's probably nuts." You know, and when I say that this is a ind censorship industrial complex, you know, obviously reflects off of the concept of military-industrial complex and the military-industrial complex, the military is literally a government agency, right? Um it becomes a point that like anything if I get called as an expert witness in a court case, which sometimes happens, chances are very good on deposition that I'm going to have to defend myself against the Southern Poverty Law Center accusations. It's like that becomes this albatross that's like a fake albatross.

It's like a heavy stuffed albatross that they've chained to your neck and you can't get rid of it because oh my gosh it's a Southern Poverty Law Center.
