It's such a rare I get kind of misty thinking about because it's just this little very rare tiny period of time like last 250 years where free speech at this seriously radical level has existed in really only one place in the world. So for me it's like I feel such gratitude towards the founders who had this vision of free of the first amendment of free speech.
